Having asked you all to follow an abbreviated report format for the 2023 Parish Annual Report, it would be unfair of me not to try to follow it in my own report to all of you.

First, thank you to an exceptional vestry who have led with wisdom, grace and good cheer, and to an executive team of senior warden, Gordon Knox, junior warden, Geoff Walker, Registrar, Clare Brooks, Treasurer, Becky Daugherty and assistant treasurer, Ann Corbett who have walked with me, and supported me unfailingly in this year of interim ministry.

Second, thank you to a staff who lead with kindness, humility and professional skill that is incomparable. They are incredibly faithful to God and all of you whom they serve.

Third, thank you to all of you who have showered me, and my husband Peder with kindness and care, and forgiveness when I insist on leading you into new ways. You may be 200 years old, but you are 200 years young with a passion to do God's work with grace and love.

2023 Reasons to Celebrate

- with your support and your vestry addressing a structural budget deficit of \$160,000 and reducing it to about \$15,000 at year's end;
- the Diocese gave us the Venerable Ruth Elder as our deacon;
- growing our annual giving, and implementing a renewed planned giving program;
- the vestry passing new by-laws for your review and I hope approval;
- increasing the number of One Worship services from 1 a year to 4;
- creating the space for a formation "hour" for adults, children, and youth;
- your flexibility in rolling with a broken Historic Church boiler, stormy weather of all types, and the necessity to reboot the schedule, along with the craziest liturgical calendar ever e.g. Advent IV and Christmas Eve the same day, and a 5 ½ week Epiphany;
- with the work of our junior warden, our facilities manager, and a generous gift from a
 parishioner the completion of a Capital Reserve Study for our facilities and grounds for the next
 20 years, and hopefully no more surprises;
- a healthy, ongoing relationship with the day school;
- growth in all our ministries including Creation Care, and our children's program, meaning we are adding back in Sunday school classes;
- amid the retirement of the Reverend Barnabas Lee, the Korean congregation continues to worship at 10:30 a.m. on Sundays in Resurrection Chapel.

2024 Goals

- updating the St. John's Employee Handbook
- the creation of a new accounting manual, recommended by our auditors;
- improved software that will help us recoup credit card fees for donations;
- a successful search for a new head of school, as our beloved Lori Dembo retires;
- a joint program with the school for families of our youngest children called Faith-Filled Families;
- an intergenerational vacation bible school in the summer;

- a successful discernment and call of a new rector for the church;
- the launch of a capital campaign to create a capital reserve fund and address immediate issues for the school and the church identified in the Capital Reserve Study;
- more teaching from the interim about being a church of this size and its implications for leaders, staff, and a new rector;
- the restoration of big fundraising events including, Bee Social (June 7th) and Oktoberfest (October 12th);
- a new mission and vision statement from the vestry.

The greatest gift of this interim time with all of you is your presence and your participation in making all this possible. I cannot imagine a better people of God to serve.

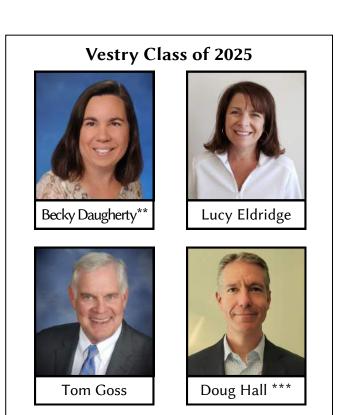

VESTRY MEMBERS offer their leadership to serve the mission of the congregation — "to strive to bring all into a closer relationship with God and one another through Jesus Christ." Vestry members serve the entire congregation rather than represent one specific ministry. They also continue to serve in the ministries of the parish, practice sound stewardship, and support our bishop and diocesan ministries.

The Vestry includes the Rector, who serves as the presiding officer, and an elected group of parish members. Together, this group is the legal governing and decision making body of a parish with regard to all matters pertaining to the church and its operations. As the presiding officer, the Rector only votes on matters when there is a tie among the other Vestry members.

Vestry duties include creating, approving, and implementing the budget, developing policies, and supporting the mission of the congregation through spiritual leadership. At large churches, such as St. John's, this includes planning and oversight. Operational, spiritual, and liturgical decisions are left to the Rector, staff, and commissions. The work of the Vestry, in collaboration with the Rector, includes identifying goals, opportunities, and challenges; creating a vision that aligns with our mission; monitoring steps toward implementing the vision; overseeing financial health and progress; developing leadership in commissions and committees; communicating with the parish; and ensuring the financial stability of the parish.

Facilities Maintenance Goals - For many years and in an effort to achieve a balanced budget, critical maintenance needs for our historic buildings and school facilities were deferred, reduced in scope or simply not addressed. As a result, we have experienced a number of extremely costly repairs or the need to replace critical infrastructure prematurely. As the current Junior Warden, and in conjunction with our Facilities Director and with support from the Vestry, Interim Rector and the Building and Grounds Committee, we are striving to make changes in how we approach and manage maintenance issues on our campus. This is a cultural change that must be accomplished in order to move us away from a reactive maintenance position that has severely impeded us, to a more methodical and pro-active stance. As a result, our Facilities Director has designed and implemented a scheduled maintenance program for in-house preventative maintenance and the contracting of a number of specialized firms to provide us with scheduled service maintenance of our more complex infrastructure and safety systems. A critical component in this effort will be the detailed information provided in our recently completed Capital Reserve Study.

HIGHLIGHT #2

Capital Reserve Study - In August 2023, the Building & Grounds Committee submitted RFPs (Request for Proposals) to a number of firms in the Baltimore/Washington region specializing in Capital Reserve Studies with an emphasis on those experienced working with churches and not-for-profit organizations. After a detailed review of the proposals, in November 2023, RECMP (Real Estate and Construction Management Partners of Baltimore, Maryland) was selected to conduct the reserve study of our campus, to include the historic church, Rose Hill, Parish Day School, Parish Life Center and other parts of our campus. The reserve study was completed in April 2024 and presented to the Vestry and School's Board of Trustees. RECMP principal Fran Anderson and his team were provided assistance on-site by Director of Facilities Brad Jones and Junior Warden Geoff Walker. A note of Thanks and Gratitude needs to be expressed to former Junior Wardens whose service has spanned over the past five decades. George Tolen, Tom Brandt,

JUNIOR WARDEN/BUILDINGS & GROUNDS (continued)

Brad Lieberman and Michael Salmons provided detailed and incredibly helpful historical data on previous maintenance practices, building histories and system designs. The information they shared helped us gain a clearer understanding of how and why our buildings function the way they do today. The reserve study will become a critical tool for both short and long-term maintenance planning but even more importantly, it will be a primary component in parish financial planning and the establishment of a reserve fund.

HIGHLIGHT #3

Parish Day School HVAC Installation Project- After multiple failures of the aging chiller system that provided cooling for the CME wing of the school and costly short-term repairs, it was determined that the most prudent course of action would be to replace the entire roof-mounted chiller system. The project was complex, involving structural engineering, plumbing and electrical reviews and was delayed multiple times due to the supply chain



challenges in the post-covid manufacturing sector. The removal of the old chiller and installation of the new chiller became a reality in July 2023 with complete installation and integration taking approximately 60 days. The school is now cool!

2024-25 GOALS

As a critical ministry, it is my promise and commitment to continue providing support to the parish, Interim Rector, Head of School, and Facilities Team. I believe we must continue to move our campus maintenance program towards a more structured and pro-active approach to maintenance and make an effort to shift away from the reactive, knee jerk maintenance solutions that have proven to be costly and sometimes ineffective. Breakdowns and systems failures are inevitable on our aging campus, but with proper financial and maintenance planning, we can hopefully reduce the number of costly, catastrophic failures that have haunted us in recent years.

HIGHLIGHT #1

With the addition of more combined services and One Worship services, we have been able to do more combined/blended music between the musicians in All Saints Hall and in the Historic Church. The most notable example of this was in June when Bishop Sutton came to rededicate the church, however more



recent examples also include the Sunday after Thanksgiving, and Palm Sunday. These blended services give the chance for all of the parish musicians to collaborate and get to know each other better. Additionally, blended music and worship provides a way for all to still hear their own preferred style of music while also getting to appreciate the other musical groups that we have.

HIGHLIGHT #2

This past year, we launched a new concert series at the parish, "Music at St. John's." This series consisted of four events, the Bicentennial Concert in October, which also included the dedication of our new digital organ, an Advent/Christmas Carol-Sing in December, a piano recital in February, and a Festival of Easter Lessons and Carols in April. Many of these concerts included the musicians of our



Historic Church ensembles. All of these concerts were well-attended by members of the church and the wider community, and have also brought in a generous amount of donations.

2024-25 GOALS

In the music ministry, we hope to continue to expand on the work that we have done this past year. The several times that we have done blended/collaborative music, they have been opportunities for the musicians to not only get to know the others' musical styles but get to know each other better, and so we hope to grow this collaboration so that we can present ourselves as one whole music ministry. We are also expanding the number of concerts this coming program year



up to five. More details on the specific event can be found by contacting the Music Director. In All Saints Hall, we are looking at obtaining new microphones and cables to make sure we are heard in the hall, and that we can better balance the singers and instruments. Some of our more long-term overall goals include the possibility of hiring an additional staff singer for the choir, hiring a pianist to occasionally play at the 9:00 a.m. service in the Historic Church, and the potential of re-establishing a children and/or youth choir in the Historic Church.

HIGHLIGHT #1

St. John's SJTC has been providing Reentry Backpacks to Howard County Detention Center (HCDC) for formerly incarcerated individuals. Backpacks are given to people who will be living outside, couch-surfing, staying in a hotel over the weekend (after a Friday evening release), or going to a treatment facility, but who don't have any possessions at the start. Currently, we have committed to 100 backpacks per year. The backpacks include basic hygiene supplies, four microwaveable meals, snacks, beverages, cold weather gear, lip balm, socks, laundry detergent pods, masks, and hand sanitizer. Parishioners have been involved in donating funds to purchase backpacks and/or supplies, filling individual backpacks as a family, and participating in group packing events when we fill many backpacks at once.

HIGHLIGHT #2

We applied for multiple grants to support the Commission's work this year, and received one of them, a \$1000 Faith in Elections Playbook Grant from Interfaith America. We began using it to facilitate bridge-building activities between St. John's and other local communities. We started with a "Deep Listening/Deep Conversations" training about how to create connections while discussing differences of opinion in order to open others' hearts and minds.

HIGHLIGHT #3

We started an Unbook Group during Adult Faith Formtion, which has been one of our most popular activities this year. Attendees can share social justice information they have read, watched, listened to, attended, or participated in, and/or listen to what others share.

2024-25 GOALS

We will continue to do more of the activities above plus further our bridge-building efforts by joining local communities in their existing service projects. We will look for more funding opportunities to support the Reentry Backpacks project. We will work to become known as a reliable source of accurate information about elections. We will reach out to the youth in our church community to connect with them and help bring their ideas to fruition. We will plan a trip to El Hogar in the Episcopal Diocese of Honduras.

HIGHLIGHT #1

Successful transitions in leadership for the Bereavement Ministry and the Prayer Chain Ministry. Thank you to outgoing coordinators (Pat Stackhouse and Tina Millard, respectively). Thank you also to Leslie Geist and Joan Fox for assuming these leadership roles.

HIGHLIGHT #2

Walking the Mourner's Path (WtMP): St. John's WtMP grief ministry continued as a leader in the Diocese of Maryland and beyond. We have continued to serve our community and make a difference in people's lives by having achieved several milestones: 1) Commissioned eight newly- trained St. John's WtMP Facilitators; 2) Hosted our fourth Facilitator Training School and instructed FTS at two host churches in another state, trained 37 laypersons and clergy from various faith communities and hospice, and expanded the reach of WtMP; 3) Facilitated one in-person and one online Workshop Series, and three Gatherings serving 24 individuals; 4) Granted funding through the 2023 Diocesan Endowment Grants for Ministry awarded to The Center for Spiritual and Mental Wellness ensuring no cost for participants. Our goals for the next year are to continue offering workshops and gatherings; taking steps to ensuring Facilitators' training is at no cost, and collaborating with other complementary ministries.

HIGHLIGHT #3

We introduced the Ministry for Mental & Spiritual Wellbeing with offices and meeting space in Rose Hill. Yoga classes and mental health resources have been offered. Our goal in the next 12 months is to grow more awareness of the ministry, define parish and community needs, recruit more ministry members, and provide assistance wherever possible.

HIGHLIGHT #4

Stephen Ministry has confidentially served 15 care receivers. Our goal for the coming year is to identify and train new Stephen Leaders.



HIGHLIGHT #5

Over the last year, the Prayer Shawl Ministry has given out 23 prayer shawls to help provide comfort to those experiencing life's difficulties. A shawl was also presented to Rev. Ann Ritonia in celebration of her ministry among us and her selection to become the Bishop Suffragan of the Armed Forces and Federal Ministries. The Ministry also continues to provide mini/pocket prayer shawls at both Welcome Centers as well as to classes from the Parish Day School participating in World Labyrinth Day.

2024-25 GOALS

Overall, the goals of the Pastoral Care Commission as a whole are to review the structure of our ministries to determine if there are additional ministry areas that need attention; Recruit additional members for new areas and replacement members as needed; Improve communications between Pastoral Care Commission members, the Clergy, the Vestry and church members to ensure that we are identifying those in need of pastoral care.



A TRIBUTE TO JERRY ANDERSON: A FAITHFUL STEPHEN MINISTER

As Christian caregivers, Stephen Ministers are called to the holy work of caring for our brothers and sisters. Within our ministry we were deeply saddened to say goodbye to our fellow Stephen Minister, Jerry Anderson, who died February 17, 2023 following a prolonged illness. One of six

St. John's Stephen Ministers specially trained online during the pandemic to meet the changing needs of the parish, Jerry's years of service as God's caring companion to his care receivers is a testament to his commitment to our church community and his deep faith that upheld him through progressive illness into death.

HIGHLIGHT #1

The Stewardship Commission assisted Rev. Mary and the St. John's staff in securing 303 pledges for 2024, amounting to over \$980,000. We had 20 fewer pledges than in 2023, but \$32,023 more in dollars. There are still 24 households who pledged in 2023 but not in 2024 whom we are continuing to contact for giving in 2024. To celebrate and thank parishioners who had pledged, Rev. Mary and the Stewardship Commission held a coffee hour with special treats on All Saints Sunday, Nov. 5, 2023.



HIGHLIGHT #2

The Planned Giving Committee developed and presented to the Vestry a proposed St. John's gift acceptance policy. The gift acceptance policy provides guidance to the Vestry, clergy, staff, volunteers, and donors on the process for reviewing gifts and the criteria for evaluating whether a gift can be accepted by St. John's or should be rejected for reasons such as a purpose inconsistent with our mission and values, the costs associated with maintaining/selling the gift, whether the gift is needed, and environmental issues. The Vestry adopted the new gift acceptance policy at its April 16, 2024 meeting.

HIGHLIGHT #3

The Planned Giving Committee began developing a St. John's planned giving program, including preparing a planned giving brochure and planning giving website pages, educating the Vestry, clergy, and staff on planned giving, and developing an initial action plan for the program.

2024-25 GOALS

1.) Launch the new St. John's planned giving program, including but not limited to: (a) Providing information to the congregation about planned giving and St. John's new planned giving program through a new brochure, new website pages, messages from the pulpit, one-on-one conversations, articles in *Blessings*, and in person education programs; (b) Communicating directly with at least 50 St. John's members about making a planned gift; and (c) Through the St. John's legacy society, the Dorsey Society, giving special recognition to people who have made planned gifts to St. John's. 2.) Assist Rev. Mary and staff with a successful 2025 annual pledge campaign; and 3.) Support the possible launch of a capital campaign in 2025.

Overview of Financial Operations:

The operations of St. John's include: the Church, the Parish Day School; and several donor and designated funds which are tracked and reported separately from our operating budgets. The Church's fiscal year runs on a calendar year basis, January through December, while the School's fiscal year begins on July 1 and runs through June 30 of the following calendar year. This fiscal year is typical of independent schools.

St. John's Episcopal Church operates as a not-for-profit entity and has a goal of reaching a break-even budget—one in which receipts from pledges, plate offerings, investment income, and facilities usage match disbursements on items including staff compensation, faith formation programs, utilities, technology, and campus upkeep. For several years, the Church has had a structural deficit, with receipts falling short of expenditures.

The new strategy is to be proactive instead of reactive with regards to these expenditure shortfalls, which are mainly facility repairs and replacements. Also, researching and implementing additional streams of income are important for a church our size to succeed. Our main objective from this proactive strategy is to prepare to receive a new rector.

Financial Highlights from 2023:

- We started the year with a budget deficit of just over \$110,000.
- In February 2023, the organ was converted to an all-digital organ. This \$93,000 project was paid for with unrestricted money from the Music Fund and generous donations.
- Middendorf payments began in March of 2023. See the Church Loan Commitments section for more details.
- There was a change in Facilities Management and staff in May 2023. Brad Jones was hired as our new Head of Facilities and Mike Ritonia was hired as a part-time Facilities Custodian.
- In June 2023, the church received \$30,000 in assistance from the Diocese, which gets counted as income for the calculation of the 2024 Diocesan pledge.
- With Rev. Ann's Ritonia's appointment to the position of Bishop Suffragan to the Armed Forces and Federal Ministries, the church welcomed Rev. Mary Sulerud as our interim rector. This clergy change resulted in cost savings as there are no pension or health insurance associated with Rev. Mary's salary.
- Facility rental income was down due to limited summer camp rentals as a result of the lack of air conditioning at the start of the summer.
- Due to these staffing changes and additional costs and a decrease in budgeted facility rental income, the budget deficit was increased in July 2023 to just under \$144,000.
- ◆ The second ask letter was sent out in July 2023, followed by a Town Hall meeting in September 2023. This letter was well received and resulted in \$48,000 in increased pledges and \$25,000 in donations to close the budget gap.

- ♦ In September 2023, the church received a rebate of \$36,000 from BGE due to an energy savings program.
- In Fall 2023, a development committee was established to plan fundraising events for the church.
- An additional loan of \$106,000 with Sandy Spring Bank was approved in September 2023 to cover the cost of additional CME HVAC repairs. See the Church Loan Commitments section for more details.
- Due to the generous response from the second ask letter and receipt of the BGE Rebate, we closed the year with a budget deficit of only \$15,000.

Goals and Accomplishments for 2024:

- The School will provide \$10,000 toward the Middendorf payments in the beginning of 2024.
- The Vestry approved the modification of the investment portfolio mix to increase the church's investment income.
- There are efforts being made to increase facility rental income, now that our large meeting spaces are air conditioned.
- The capital reserve study was completed in March 2024 and will be used as the basis for an upcoming Capital Campaign.
- The newly formed Development Committee is planning two big events for 2024, the Bee Social on June 7th and Oktoberfest in September.
- To better position the Church financially to call a new rector.

Stewardship:

Pledges are budgeted at \$1,000,000 for 2024, and as of late- April, pledges stand at just over \$980,000 compared to \$957,000 in 2023. The number of pledging units for 2024 is 303 compared to 328 in 2023; and the average pledge increased from \$2,766 in 2023 to \$3,237 in 2024. We are excited to have 19 new pledges for 2024.

St. John's Parish Day School (SJPDS):

SJPDS is comprised of the Lower School (K through 5th grade) and the Early Childhood Program (3-year-olds through pre-K). Its school building, the CME, was completed in 2001 and accepted its inaugural class of first graders in 2002. For more information about SJPDS, please refer to the Head of School Report.

Church-School Shared Expenses:

The Church pays the full "shared" expenses for the current year; and the School pays the Church an estimated monthly amount for its portion of these shared expenses. For 2023, the School paid about \$560,000, of which \$243,000 was for the School's portion of the mortgage and the rest was their portion of facility maintenance expenses.

These shared expenses are laid out in a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the Church and the School that runs from July 1, 2022, through June 30, 2023. Discussions will soon be underway to update the MOU for the 2023 – 2024 academic year.

TREASURER'S REPORT (continued)

Church Loan Commitments:

- Mortgage: The balance on the mortgage debt as of 12/31/2023 was \$3,197,604, down from \$3,447,840 on 12/31/23. The original mortgage was a tax-exempt bond issued in conjunction with the Maryland Health and Higher Education Facilities Authority (MHHEFA) in December 2001. It matures in December 2031. The interest rate is reset every ten years, and the final reset occurred in December 2021 at 1.67 percent. This bond has a debt service covenant ratio requirement which both the Church and the School met for 2023. Light the Way funds are being used to reduce the impact of the annual debt service payments on the Church's operating budget. The School pays a portion of the mortgage cost as part of its shared operating expenses (see above).
- Middendorf Loan: This loan is for the HVAC Unit in the CME building (new addition). The terms are \$400,000 over 20 years at 3% interest. Monthly payments began in March 2023 and are about \$2,200 per month.
- Sandy Spring Loan: The loan terms are 5 years at 7.09%. Monthly payments are around \$3,000 per month
- ◆ Line of Credit: The Church has a \$250,000 line of credit with Sandy Spring Bank (which acquired Revere Bank) to provide periodic support for the cyclical cash flows of the Church and SJPDS. The line was temporarily used in September 2023 until the loan mentioned above was setup.

Light the Way (LtW) Funds:

The LtW campaign, launched in 2015, generated pledge receipts of \$1,278,705. These funds allow the Church to make beneficial investments in our people, programs, and campus. The balance in LtW funds as of 12/31/23 is \$229,332, and will primarily be used for the mortgage payments on the CME building. In 2023, the Light the Way funds were used to only pay the Church portion of the mortgage payment.

For 2024, \$50,000 is earmarked for the following: \$45,000 for support of the operating budget for payment on the mortgage/bond and \$5,000 for education.

Closing:

There are optimistic plans for covering the budget deficit with the two fundraising events, the anticipated increase in investment income, and the additional facilities rentals. Our financial goal for 2024 is being proactive as part of our efforts to be in a good financial position to call a new rector to St. John's.

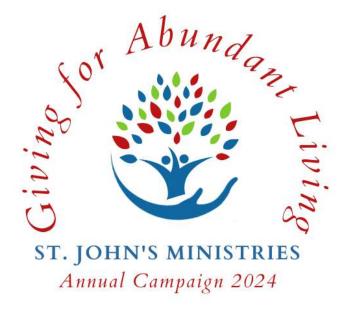

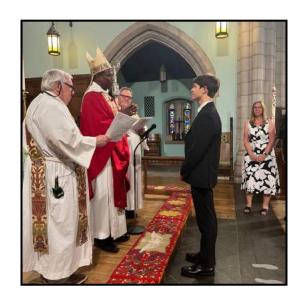

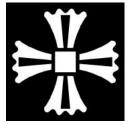

2023 ANNUAL MEETING MINUTES

7 May 2023

The 2023 Annual Meeting of St. John's Episcopal Church, Queen Caroline Parish, Ellicott City, Maryland was called to order by the Reverend Ann Ritonia, Rector, at 12:00 PM on Sunday, May 7, 2023.

A motion was made to adopt the agenda. Ron Buchman made the motion, and it was seconded by Clare Brooks. The motion was approved unanimously.

Opening

Rev. Ann opened the meeting in prayer.

Beth Mackey was appointed as Secretary, and it was determined that those present constitute a quorum. Gordon Knox was appointed Parliamentarian.

The Necrology was read.

The 2022-23 Annual Report was distributed electronically prior to the Annual Meeting and printed versions were made available at the meeting.

Last year's Annual Meeting minutes moved for approval by Scot Millen and seconded by Russ Corbett. The motion was approved unanimously by voice vote.

Report of the Nominating Committee

Nominating Committee member Nancy McAllister reviewed the eligibility for voting and the rules for balloting. Committee members included Dan Wise (Chair), Nancy, Susan Watts, Vivian Stone, and Ann Corbett. Rev. Ann thanked the members of the nominating committee.

Nancy McAllister reported that the nominees to serve on Vestry for a three-year term as the class of 2026 were Scott Geist, John Helder, Townsend "Sandy" Hornor Jr., Katie Kelel, Don Lambert, Lucia Martin, and Marcia Trant. Tom Goss, Anna Loomis, Cindy Millen, Tom Goss, Brian Stone, and Susan Watts were nominated as Lay Delegates to the Diocesan Convention.

Phil Stackhouse made a motion to accept the report of the nominating committee, close nominations and proceed to voting for four Vestry members and four Lay Delegates.

Nancy McAllister was appointed as head teller, and Susan Watts and Vivian Stone were appointed as tellers to conduct the vote, and ballots were distributed. The tellers collected the ballots and retired to another room to count the vote.

Rector's Report

Rev. Ann gave verbal comments in addition to her written report in the Annual Report. In a few short weeks she will be leaving the parish to begin her new position as Suffragan Bishop of the Armed Forces. Her heart is full, and she is grateful for getting through the pandemic. She emphasized the importance of reading the written reports that have already been submitted.

Commission leaders were asked to stand and were thanked by Rev. Ann and the Parish. She noted that the Labyrinth Ministry have had the labyrinth registered and it has been recognized nationally.

Mike Salmons was thanked for his work as Jr. Warden as he worked through all of the challenges of managing an aging facility with limited facilities staff. Rev. Ann welcomed the new Director of Facilities, Brad Jones.

Rev. Ann continued with her thank you's, calling out especially Outreach, Social Justice, Children and Youth Ministry. She mentioned that the Vestry has been working with Rev. Kristofer Lindh-Payne on the Gather-Transform -Ministry model. Brian Stone completed the first year of the College of Congregational Development and will be working on a project related to inviting new members into the life of the Parish. All were encouraged to participate.

Rev. Ann thanked the lay leadership and her staff: Vestry Officers Scot Millen, Mike Salmons, Ann Corbett, and Beth Mackey, as well as her

staff, Kathy Young, Kathy Hahn, Tracey Stone, Rev. Stephen and Rev. Dr. Katrina Grusell and Russ Warner. She thanked the Pastoral Care Team (bereavement, meals, Stephen Ministry, Walking the Mourner's Path) and volunteers with this group were applauded by the Parish. She welcomed our new music minister, Justin Pechulis, who has stepped right in to replace Jason. She expressed her gratitude for the work done to stand up the Center for Spiritual and Mental Well-being, and those on the advisory board were recognized.

While recognizing that we have lost people who have gotten out of the habit of coming to church since the pandemic, she was proud to report that 30 new pledging members joined this year. She is also grateful to Lori Dembo and the Parish Day School. Thanks were given to Lori for her leadership.

Rev. Ann thanked Sally Goss and all others who helped host the Diocesan election of the new Bishop of Maryland. Those who helped were recognized and thanked by the Parish. Rev Ann also thanked the Bicentennial Committee for all their work this year. A One Worship will be held on June 4th with Bishop Sutton presiding to celebrate. She reported that almost 200 people have come to tour the church at the two events held so far this year.

Senior Warden

Senior Warden Scot Millen made a few comments in addition to his written report. Rev. Ann thanked Scot warmly for being a steady counsel and friend this year. Scot thanked all the Vestry members and summarized his thoughts by saying that "it's all about love" - love your neighbor, love the Lord. Scot thanked Gordon Knox for agreeing to be nominated as Senior Warden (pending new Vestry approval).

Junior Warden

Junior Warden Mike Salmons made a few comments in addition to his written report. He said that there were really no words to describe the number and pace of things that happened this year. It was a challenging year and he welcomed Brad. Mike explained that the Vestry had to make a hard decision this year to replace the CME chiller, and it was not made lightly. Mike thanked the SJPDS's patience with the portable A/C solution. On a positive note, he recognized that St. John's is known widely for our stewardship -- gardens, rain gardens, storm water runoff. He thanked Geoff Walker and Brad Lieberman for their work on repairing the Creche, and for the innovations made to Rose Hill.

Mike said that there are two things the Parish needs: we need an infusion of funds and volunteers to help. He closed by thanking Rev. Ann for her confidence, trust and support, and to the congregation for its support.

Treasurer

Ann Corbett provided a verbal update to the Annual Report. Last year the Vestry passed a 1.26m budget based on an expected 954K in pledge income and 200K from other sources (including funds from Parkview). Last year we received financial assistance from the Diocese and were grateful. There has been lower giving during the pandemic, but the decline in pledging is leveling off. The 2023 budget expects 1.1 m receipts, with 900K in pledges. Our expenses are outpacing giving, leaving a deficit of 110K in this year's budget. We have requested 68K from the Diocese, but any remaining gap will need to be closed from assets. The Diocese won't make its decision on relief until June. so we are operating with unknowns at this point. The Vestry will continually revisit and revise this year's budget as needed.

Because we have not been setting aside money for maintenance and replacement, when the CME chiller needed to be replaced, we applied for and were granted a Middendorf loan from the Diocese. The loan is for 400K, at 3% interest over 20 years. The first year is zero percent

interest. Ann Corbett also gave an update on the mortgage, which was last reset in 2021 at 1.67%. There is a balance of 3.37m left. Light the Way funds are being used to reduce impact of debt service. There will be a final balloon payment of 646K due in January 2032. Both SJPDS and SJEC use the CME, and the school and church each pay a portion of the operating expenses as laid out an MOU. In closing, 2023 is challenging financially and we will likely have to tap into assets. The Vestry added a Finance and Investment committee this year. Ann C. said that it's been a privilege to serve as Treasurer and she was recognized by the Parish.

SJPDS

Lori Dembo, SIDPS Head of School made a few comments to the Parish. She thanked Rev. Ann, the Vestry and especially Mike Salmons for their support. This year's big milestone was passing accreditation with a glowing report and stellar evaluation. AIMS is the most important accreditation for private schools in our area. There were 318 children attending programs this year (full is 328), with 305 already signed up for next year and she expects to be up to 320 by fall. This year they freshened up with new paint, bought new computers, and brought in a dedicated STEM teacher. The Board of Trustees has been dedicated in support for the teachers and staff, and she is proud of their 98% retention of faculty and staff. A reserve fund/ endowment is now being built up. This year's Fifth grade students were accepted into every school they applied for. SJPDS has an A+ social media rating three years in a row. She closed by thanking Rev. Ann again.

Awards

In the absence of a report from the Tellers, the agenda proceeded with the awards. Rev. Ann recognized the retiring Vestry Members, Scot Millen, Mike Salmons, Ann Corbett, Beth Mackey and Susan Watts and Vivian Stone.

Rev. Ann then presented the annual Awards and recognized all previous award winners.

The first award presented was the Thomas Cranmer Award, which recognizes a parishioner who has a deep commitment to prayer. Peggy Burrows was this year's recipient.

The next award was the St. John's Cross, which is given to a member who in the last year has helped us fulfill our mission. This year's recipient was Mike Salmons was presented with this award.

A new award was presented this year, the St. Francis Creation Care Award. This award is in recognition of those who care for God's creation. This year's recipient was Nancy McAllister

The St. John's Award is given to one or more parishioners who give of themselves and who exemplify the spirit of St John's and who live out our mission in the community. The first recipient this year was Ann Corbett. The St. John's Award was also presented posthumously to Jerry Anderson, who passed away earlier this year. Judy Anderson accepted the gift on his behalf.

Q&A

The floor was opened for questions. The first question was about the financial situation. With the loss of 150 pledging members over the last five years, the HVAC loan and lack of funding, who is leading a long term plan? Treasurer Ann Corbett acknowledged the challenging situation and responded that we are expecting to launch a Capital Campaign this fall. The Vestry will work with the Interim Rector, who has extensive experience in fundraising.

The next question was about what is happening with Clark House. Mike Salmons explained that the SJEC youth are using the top floor, and that the ground floor and second floor are rented to JHU Peabody School of Music six days a week. Mike described this as a win-win, since they are taking good care of the building and it is generating 25-30K a year. We are hoping to continue this relationship.

2023 ANNUAL MEETING MINUTES (continued)

A question was asked about whether or not there was a list of things that need to be done around campus that parishioners with time and talent could tackle. Mike Salmons agreed that there are things that can be done by volunteers and that he would put together a list. He also mentioned that the B&G commission has openings and that's another good way to get involved.

A question was asked about whether or not we have conducted a reserve study, which documents the state of the facilities to project needs, timelines, and costs. This has not been done due to the pressures of this year but is needed.

The next question was about the 2023 summer worship schedule. Rev. Ann said that due to the A/C situation in ASH, services would be at 5PM Saturdays, and Sundays at 9AM and 1030 in the Historic Church.

Mike Salmons explained that the new HVAC system was expected to be installed in May, but due to parts delays it will not be installed until late July. Mike acknowledged that ASH will be warm for the Rummage Sale in June but that the auditorium will be cool. We will use fans to keep the air moving in ASH, but it will be warm.

In response to a question about the 2023 operating budget, it was first said that it was in the Annual Report, but later that was corrected when it was confirmed that it was not included. Rev. Ann said that it will go out quickly under separate cover and she will put a link to it online with the Annual Report.
